I am thrilled to report that **2006** and **2007** were amazing years of God's love in action! They were years in which ENLACE met the burgeoning opportunities in El Salvador and began to reach out around the world. We are incredibly thankful for God's provision and excited to see what is to come.

In the last two years we have focused our efforts on solidifying and expanding our approach. We coached 12 churches through the process of self-discovery, connecting, and collaborating with their communities to create long-term solutions to poverty. We currently have another 15 churches interested in transforming their communities.

To meet this growing opportunity, we have doubled our church partners and staff and also added new volunteers that are contributing significantly to the team. We have been able to strengthen our organizational capacity by adding a full-time CFO, Development Director, and Communications Director along with a new Research and Evaluation Department to study and improve our approach. We have also strengthened the U.S. Board by creating a development program and adding new members.

In the last two years, we have provided training to missions leaders in Columbia and the United States. We have also provided consulting for organizational leaders working in Uganda, Rwanda and Peru.

I am extremely excited to see God continue to direct His Church and ENLACE. Please pray with us as ENLACE takes steps to meet the growing possibilities in the future.

Sincerely, Ron Bueno, Executive Director ENLACE (pronounced *en-lah-say* it is the Spanish word for link) commits to a 10-year relationship with churches in El Salvador. We equip the church leaders to become effective agents of change as they understand who they are as a body, listen to their community and respond to opportunities for developing sustainable solutions for poverty. ENLACE's long-term goal for each church is to be become a leader that equips surrounding churches. Churches go through a process of being "interested," then "committed" and eventually "leaders" in its community. A leader church (or 'lider' in Spanish) embodies the following values:












ENLACE USA REVENUE 2007




ENLACE USA EXPENDITURES 2007



WHERE WE ARE GOING


